DuPage County Historical Museum Annual Report

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Introduction

The DuPage County Historical Museum (Museum) functions as the only institution dedicated to the collection, preservation, and interpretation of the material culture documenting all of DuPage County. As a 501© 3 organization, the DuPage County Historical Museum Foundation (Foundation) raises money to support the Museum. The Museum is free to the public and open five days a week.

Mission Statement

The DuPage County Historical Museum is operated as a facility of Wheaton Park District, owned by the County of DuPage by resolution of the County Board pursuant to state stature. Its principal purposes are to educate the general public through the collection, preservation, interpretation, and exhibition of materials which document the history of DuPage County and its relationship to Illinois and the nation, and to provide local history services for historical organizations and for scholarly endeavors.

Visitor Data

In 2022, the Museum served 4,220 visitors. This was an increase of 52% after 2021's COVID-19 outbreak. See data in graphs on page 6.

COVID-19 Pandemic

In 2022, the Museum was not under any state or federal guidelines for closures. There was a state mask mandate until the end of February 2022. Numbers for visitors, birthday parties, rentals, etc. still remained lower when compared to 2019 numbers; however, they rebounded significantly compared to 2020 and 2021. The Museum expects more visitors in 2023 with a full return of visitors in 2024.





In 2022, visitors from 33 states and the 5 countries of Canada, Czech Republic, United Kingdom, Norway, and Italy visited the Museum.



Education

The Museum provides special events, programs, presentations, and tours to audiences of all ages as part of our mission. Programming explores people, places, and events that shaped DuPage County.

COVID-19 and Museum Education

The Museum continued to offer virtual tours of exhibits. These tours allow for a video to be created of the exhibit to add to the online exhibit archive. Three virtual programs were offered in 2022. Craft to-go kits continued to be offered as well for those who wished to pick up an activity to complete safely at home. Birthday parties and scout groups rebounded to pre-COVID numbers.

Museum Events

The Museum collaborated with local organizations (listed below) to provide engaging events and family workshops at little or no cost to the attendees. Total fees for presenters in 2022 were \$1,798.11. Event co-sponsors reimbursed \$100 and the DuPage Foundation grant covered \$1,675. Events are listed in Appendix 2.

Santa Express

The Museum hosted five Santa Express trips for 594 participants. Families enjoyed cookies and beverages while singing carols and reading holiday stories aboard the Metra train. Santa visited with each family. The program netted \$7,560.08. Arrowhead Golf Club sponsored the snacks and Smile Doctors sponsored the children's goodie bags.

Birthday Parties

The Museum offers birthday parties for children aged 4 to 12. Birthday parties are \$175 for 10 children. Additional children cost \$10 each. In 2022, the Museum hosted six birthday parties with 57 children. The average cost of a birthday party was \$180. Total revenue was \$1,080 with a profit margin of 93%.

Outreach Events

COVID-19 still continued to cancel many outreach events, however, staff attended four events talking directly to 140 visitors at the Museum tables. Staff also sets up outreach tables at Museum Foundation events reaching even more people. An estimated 12,978 people attended these events.

Presentations

The Museum staff provides presentations for groups and organizations. The number of inquiries for presentations increased in 2022. The Museum delivered seven presentations, reaching 139 participants at libraries, retirement communities, and an alumni group. Two of these engagements resulted in Museum staff creating new presentations that have been added to the list of speaking topics offered.

Camps

In 2022, 14 summer camp sessions were offered and 13 sessions ran with a total of 192 participants. Of the 13 sessions, 11 were contracted LEGO camps with Play-Well TEKnologies and two were staff-facilitated. Camps had a profit margin of 37%.

Craft To-Go Kits


Staff created two craft to-go kits in 2022. The Museum offered curbside pick up for convenience and accessibility. Kits were \$15 each. Thirty-five kits were sold netting \$468.27.

Guided Tours, School, and Scout Programs

Tours are available for \$5 - \$10 per person. School and scout programs are available for \$5 - \$7 per student/scout. Virtual options for schools and scouts are also available. There were 29 paid tours and programs conducted in 2022, earning \$2,136. These tours and programs reached 482 participants. In addition, 13 organizations took advantage of self-guided tours bringing another 135 visitors to the Museum.

Collection

In 2022, 31 generous donors gifted the Museum over 200 artifacts to the permanent, education, and research collections. Staff continues to evaluate artifacts for deaccession following best practices of the American Alliance of Museums. The Museum continues making the photograph and artwork collection publicly accessible through the PastPerfect Online Database. Currently, 2,961 artifacts are uploaded for community members to view from the comfort of their homes.

Voices of DuPage

In Fall 2016, the Museum began an oral history initiative to record DuPage residents' stories for future generations. Since its inception, staff has collected 46 histories on themes of civil rights, veterans, agriculture, and local histories.

Museum Research and Reproductions

Museum staff provides research services for \$25 per hour with the first 30 minutes free. Reproductions of photographs are also available for a fee. In 2022, staff completed 82 research requests.

In addition, *Wheaton, Illinois: Golf History Starts Here* remained on display at Arrowhead Golf Club. The Museum also displays the 36th Illinois Infantry National Colors and 8th Illinois Cavalry Guidon on loan from the Illinois State Military Museum.

Staff assisted William North to display historic photographs with his modern photography in *Wheaton's Historic Architecture: A Closer Look* at Wheaton Public Library.

Institutional Stewardship Building Preservation

In 2022, the County of DuPage (County) continued working with staff to monitor and adjust storage conditions in the building for artifacts. The new humidifier from 2021 was adjusted to reach ideal levels for both patrons and artifacts.

In 2021, the Park District and County partnered to submit a proposal to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources for their Museum Capital Grant Program. This project includes stabilization of the masonry and rebuilding the historic gutter system for the building. The grant was awarded in early 2022, plans were created with historic preservation in mind. Work is expected to begin late summer of 2023.

The Museum updated its small kitchenette on the second floor in late 2022-early 2023 to be more accommodating to rentals and educational program usage. The *Inside History Gallery* also received a fresh coat of paint, floor rewax, and a new clear protective coat on the train table.


StEPs Program and Accreditation

The Museum continues to work towards future accreditation through the American Association of State and Local History's (AASLH) Standards of Excellence Program (StEPs). StEPs is a voluntary training program consisting of five sections of three sets of guidelines for best practices as laid out by the American Alliance of Museums (AAM). AAM is the accrediting body in the United States.

Since 2020, COVID-19 slowed progress in the StEPs program. In 2022, a new curator began and staff focused on the curators training. Best practices are being worked into new policies and in daily practice. This will continue as core policies are evaluated and for accreditation.

Staff began gathering information for how to train the two governing boards (County and Park Board) as well as the fundraising Foundation. Staff continues to work on accreditation necessities of building preservation, improving collection management, and continued improving environmental and security for artifacts. Staff started planning for the replacement of the permanent gallery as a necessary step before applying for accreditation.

Accreditation also requires the Museum to diversify its collections, programming, exhibit coverage, and other areas of operation. Staff has focused on building relationships within the community which will cultivate and attract more diversified donations into the collections. New programming including the beginning of the Trailblazers branding will focus on marginalized members and groups of society to highlight their importance throughout DuPage history. These initiatives will continue as preparation for accreditation continues.

Wheaton Park District Administration

The Museum building functions as the Administrative Office for the Wheaton Park District. Museum Assistants serve in an administrative capacity for the Park District by answering phones, assisting with registration, finance paperwork, and other administrative tasks.

Staff Changes

Curator Zachary Bishop stepped down to pursue a position at the Schingoethe Center and moved to the weekend Museum Assistant position. Emily O'Brien became Curator in April 2022. The Museum also hired Museum Assistants Beth Frederick and Ben Bulpitt.

Staff Development

All staff is CPR/AED certified and takes yearly online training though the Park District's risk management company. The Museum continues to be listed on the Giant Steps Autism-friendly Directory. Museum Manager attends the Wheaton Chamber of Commerce's DEI Committee and sits on the American Association of State and Local History's History in our Parks Taskforce.

Volunteers

In 2022, ten individual volunteers served a total of 149.5 hours. These volunteers are listed to the right; to view a complete list of volunteer hours, see Appendix 4.

On March 6, for the Museum's Recognizing Trailblazers event, a Girl Scout troop volunteered to greet people at the event. A local Boy Scout, Peter Dioro, volunteered his time to lead the Pledge of Allegiance. In total, they volunteered 12 hours.

The DuPage Society of Model Engineers (DPSME) continued to volunteer by maintaining the model train layout. On the third and fifth Saturdays each month they run the trains. They assist with members-only train hours for the children's Explorer's Club. The engineers also operate the train for special events at the request of our patrons. In 2022, DPSME volunteered a total of 680 hours.

Marketing and Communications

In 2022, the Museum focused its attention and communication on new exhibits, programs, special events and Train Saturdays. Each year an annual marketing calendar is developed that guides marketing staff month by month through various initiatives, email blasts, social media posts, newsletters, and appeals.

In 2022, the marketing department distributed seven press releases featuring topics such as Casino Night, Night at the Museum, October Fest, and grant announcements including the \$750,000 grant awarded to fund masonry and gutter repairs on the Museum building received from the IDNR Museum Capital Grant Program.

Two annual newsletters were distributed by mail and email that included program and event listings, current Museum topics, staff or donor spotlights and exhibit announcements.

A total of 31 eblasts were distributed in 2022, with an average click through rate of 6%. These monthly eblasts ranged from promoting Foundation events, Foundation campaigns, summer camps, programs, exhibit openings and general Museum news.

Museum staff spoke with Naperville Magazine and West Suburban Magazine in 2022 to be featured in articles. Naperville Magazine published "Page Turners" in December 2022 and West Suburban Magazine's article appeared in January 2023. Museum Curator Emily O'Brien also spoke with two local radio stations, K-LOVE and WDCB, about upcoming exhibits and events.

New photographs were taken of the model trains and DuPage Society of Model Engineers for future marketing materials.

Sponsorship

The Museum was fortunate to receive renewed support from First Trust through a Community Engagement sponsorship which helped support annual programs, exhibits and special projects.

Additional sponsors in 2022 for events include Fairhaven Wealth, Inland Real Estate Group, Arrowhead Golf Club and Smile Doctors.









Social Media

Museum and marketing staff cooperatively maintain Facebook and Instagram. All platforms are updated two to four times per week. Posts focus on exhibits, artifacts, events, County history, and facility information. See statistics to the right for Facebook and Instagram.

Advocacy

In 2022, several elected officials visited the Museum. In March, County Board Member Greg Hart and Illinois Representative Terra Costa Howard attended the Recognizing Trailblazers event. That spring, Museum staff met with Illinois Representative Janet Yang Rohr and Illinois Representative Anne Stava-Murray. Staff provided research and a tour for County Board Member Dawn DeSart.

Museum Shop

The Museum Shop focuses on unique, hard to find, or local history objects. It also features items related to current exhibits. In 2022, the Shop made \$1,145.78, doubling 2021. Select Special attention has been devoted to the shop in eblasts. New children's puzzles were added in 2022 with more plans to add items in 2023.

DuPage County Historical Museum Foundation

The DuPage County Historical Museum Foundation is recognized as a 501©3 by the State of Illinois. The Foundation's primary function is to raise funds to support the Museum's mission. The Foundation meets monthly to review and discuss Museum initiatives. They work closely with the Development team and Museum staff members to solicit donations, grants, sponsorships, memberships and assist with the coordination of their signature fundraising events.

Casino Night was held, for the first time, at Arrowhead Golf Club. It was well-received and successful in securing net proceeds over \$16,000. October Fest was held, once again, in conjunction with the Light the Torch Run at the Central Athletic Complex and generated close to \$7,000.

The Foundation revenue generating events include concession proceeds from the Shakespeare in the Park held in August, Night at the Museum Halloween Party in October and the 4Ever4 Beatles Cocktail Hour and Trivia Night in November.

The Foundation also raises funds through the annual spring appeal, Giving DuPage Days and the year-end appeal. The appeal campaigns include mailed letters, emails, and social media posts. The spring appeal theme/focus was about the County's 183 anniversary and the winter appeal's theme was family and focused on the local families that shaped DuPage County. Giving DuPage Days promote all non-profit organizations and takes place each May. In 2022, this event brought in \$660.00.

Additional revenue sources for the Foundation throughout the year included proceeds from two runs and the Memorial Park Concert Series. The Light the Torch Night Run brought in \$4,196 and Lions Club Reindeer Run saw \$2,000 in revenue for the Foundation. Concession tips from the Memorial Park concert series generated close to \$1,500.00 in 2022.

The Museum membership program continues to see small growth each year with most interest in the children's Explorer Club Membership program. At the end of 2022, the Foundation had 59 members compared to 50 in 2021.

Members receive various perks based on membership level including additional private access to Train Saturdays, early access to Santa Express ticket sales, complimentary entrance to the Night at the Museum event and special invites to exhibit openings. In addition, all Museum memberships include access into the Time Travelers Network which allows access and discounts to over 300 museums and zoos across the nation.



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These Illinois museums received a total of \$19.7 million in state capital investments

ILLINOIS - Thirty-six Illinois museums will receive a total of \$19.7 million in state capital investments to improve their facilities and develop new exhibits, Gov. JB Pritzker announced Wednesday.

According to a news release from Pritzker's office, The investments are made possible through the Illinois Public Museum Capital Grants Program, funded by the governor's bipartisan Rebuild Illinois capital program, the first in nearly a decade.

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"Rebuilding Illinois means investing in all types of infrastructure that improve communities and the quality of life for local residents. That includes an investment in the museums that protect our cultural heritage and offer unique programs and events for visitors to enjoy," Pritzker said. "I am pleased to see the array of improvements and exhibits that will happen as a result of our 2022 Public Museum Capital Grants, made possible through the Rebuild Illinois capital program."

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According to the release, the Illinois Public Museum Capital Grants Program, administered by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, is open to any museum operated by local government or located on municipally owned land. The maximum grant award for projects is \$750,000, and matching funds are required in many cases based on museum attendance levels, the release states.

"Museums are an important economic driver and point of pride in communities throughout Illinois," said Colleen Callahan, director of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. "Providing funding for capital improvements and exciting new exhibits helps to create jobs, attract more visitors, and boost local tourism."

WHEATON – The Wheaton Park District recently was awarded a \$750,000 grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to pursue a project aimed at stabilizing the masonry and rebuilding the gutters of the DuPage County Historical Museum building in Wheaton.

The historic 1891 building originally housed the Adams Memorial Library and currently houses historical exhibits, artifacts and archives that help tell the story of the county's history, according to a news release. The museum is operated as a facility of the Wheaton Park District and is owned by the county.

The grant will be issued through the IDNR's Museum Capital Grant Program.

"The quality of your plans to enhance museum opportunities for Illinois' citizens is recognized by your selection in this year's very competitive selection process," Gary Eicken, chief of the IDNR's Office of Grant Management Assistance, wrote in a letter to Wheaton Park District Executive Director Michael Benard. "Congratulations on being a successful applicant and thank you for your dedicated efforts to improve cultural and educational opportunities in Illinois."

The museum is at 102 E. Wesley St. in Wheaton.

"The much-needed building repairs to the DuPage County Historical Museum, enabled by this generous grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, will allow county residents and visitors to continue benefiting greatly from the museum's exemplary programs and exhibits for years to come," Benard said in the release.

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



EXHIBIT CELEBRATES LOCAL AUTHORS



Who knew Little Orphan Annie has roots in Lombard?

You can learn more about her creator as well as other area fiction writers at *Stories of DuPage: Reading Between the Lines*, an exhibit running through March 25 at the DuPage County Historical Museum (102 E. Wesley St., Wheaton). "The exhibit explores how these authors' experiences in DuPage may have influenced their lives and the stories they wrote, even subconsciously," explains Emily O'Brien, museum curator. "Authors such as Harold Gray, the original cartoonist for *Little Orphan Annie*; Marguerite Henry, the author of the beloved children's book *Misty of Chincoteague*; and Timothy Zahn, author of the popular *Star Wars* spinoff trilogy *Thrawn*, are just a few examples of the 15 fiction authors who are featured."



Other locals showcased include Glennette Tilley Turner, an Underground Railroad historian who also has penned nine children's books (An Apple for Harriet Tubman and Running for Our Lives); Jeffery Deaver, best-selling thriller author of more than 40 novels; Mary Doria Russell, whose A Thread of Grace was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize; and Emily Griffin, lawyer-turned-author with 11 novels that have sold a total of 12 million copies worldwide.

"What I found most surprising while working on this exhibit was truly how many wellknown authors there were from DuPage County," O'Brien says. "Growing up out of state, I didn't necessarily expect to recognize as many authors from DuPage County as I did. It really showed how far-reaching some of these authors are."

The exhibit explores its themes through photographs, books, author and book memorabilia, quills, typewriters, and other writing equipment. "My favorite thing is the layers of relatability it has to visitors at the museum," O'Brien says. "On one hand, you're localizing authors that many visitors may have known through [the writers'] work to a much more intimate and personal experience of living within DuPage County. It gives visitors a chance to reorient themselves to their favorite stories, like Misty of Chincoteague, and look at it from a different perspective than before. Suddenly there are new connections being made between them and their favorite books that may not have been there before knowing the author grew up right next door."



Although all of the featured authors have lived in DuPage County, only two of the books on display are set there. "Downers Grove is a coming-of-age thriller novel that takes place in $Downers\ Grove\ and\ is\ heavily\ influenced\ by\ Michael\ Hornburg's\ own\ teenage\ years\ there,"$ O'Brien says. "The Girl Who Owned a City is a dystopian novel that takes place in Glen Ellyn, where O.T. Nelson grew up, and highlights what life would be like for children growing up in a world without adults. Both of these books draw heavily from the authors' experience as DuPage County residents."

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
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
