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#### Introduction

DuPage County Historical Museum (DCHM) functions as the only institution dedicated to the collection, preservation and interpretation of the material culture documenting the county of DuPage, Illinois. As a 501(c)(3) organization, the DuPage County Historical Museum Foundation raises money for the support of the Museum.

#### **Mission Statement**

The DuPage County Historical Museum is operated as a facility of Wheaton Park District, owned by the County of DuPage by resolution of the County Board pursuant to state statute. Its principal purposes are to educate the general public through the collection, preservation, interpretation, & exhibition of materials which document the history of DuPage County & its relationship to Illinois and the nation, and to provide local history services for historical organizations and for scholarly endeavors.







In 2017, the Museum had visitors from 44 states as shown below, as well as 14 other countries.



#### **Education**

The Museum provides events, programs, tours, and presentations to audiences of all ages as part of our mission. Programming explores people, places, and events that shaped DuPage County.

#### **Museum Events**

The Museum collaborated with local organizations, including the Wheaton Public Library, DuPage County Historical Society (DCHS), Culinary Historians of Northern Illinois, and DuPage County Genealogical Society to provide engaging events and family workshops at little or no cost to the attendees. Total fees for presenters in 2017 were \$2,369. The Museum paid \$640, DuPage Foundation paid \$250 and American Library Association paid \$1,079 for grant-funded programs, and \$400 was reimbursed from DCHS for a partnered event. Events are listed in Appendix 1.

#### Santa Express

The Museum hosted five Santa Express trips in December for 601 participants. Children in pajamas enjoyed milk and cookies, while staff sang carols and read stories. Santa made a special appearance visiting each family. This program netted \$7,152.41 (2016: \$5,747.83 for four trips). Two sponsors provided cookies and milk: Chick Fil A and Arrowhead Golf Course.

#### **Birthday Parties**

Birthday parties are \$150 for 10 children. Additional children cost \$5 each. In 2017, four birthday parties were held with 57 children participating. A total revenue \$685 with a profit margin of 84%.

#### **Outreach Events**

The Museum participated in 11 outreach events in 2017. The Museum hosted a table and ran an activity at these events to bring awareness to the Museum mission. Staff spoke directly with 2,731 people at these events, though more than 19,730 people came in contact with the booth or staff.

#### **Presentations**

The Museum staff facilitates educational presentations for clubs and other organizations throughout the County. The education collection which includes duplicate or reproduction artifacts, allow for hands-on experiences to the public. Four presentations educated 111 attendees and netted \$325 for the Museum in 2017.

#### **Voices of DuPage**

In fall 2016, the Museum began an oral history initiative to record the DuPage residents' stories for future generations. To accompany the *Changing America* exhibit in January 2017, the theme for Voices was the Civil Rights Movement. The Museum partnered with the DuPage AME Church recording nearly two dozen individuals' stories which were used in the exhibit from January through March.


#### **Camps**

In 2017, the Museum offered eight camps. This included six LEGO camps of various themes facilitated by an outside contractor and two staff facilitated camps. Camps netted \$8,568.83 (2016 - \$7,283.14) with a profit margin of 37%.

#### **Guided Tours, School, and Scout Programs**

Guided tours explain the building's history and changing exhibits. An architectural walking tour of downtown Wheaton is also available. The Museum offers various programs for school and scout groups. There were 21 tours and programs conducted in 2017 earning \$1,144. Twenty-four schools took advantage of self-guided tours. Due to the public school budget crisis, staff expects self-guided tours to continue increasing every year. The listing of 2017 tour groups can be found in Appendix 1.

# Collection Collection Status

In 2017, Museum staff finished a complete inventory and cataloged all items into the Museum's PastPerfect software. This included over 22,000 three-dimensional objects and 248 linear feet of archival material. Staff and volunteers have photographed over 35% of the permanent collection. Over 90% of three-dimensional items stored in the Museum have been photographed.

Thirty-six new donors donated over 300 objects to the permanent collection, education collection, and research library. Staff continues to evaluate artifacts that no longer meet the mission for deaccession in accordance with the American Alliance of Museum's Best Practices.

The Museum opened Dunton's Art Gallery in the second floor Auditorium to showcase artwork from the collection. This yearly changing exhibit debuted with a focus on the history of famous buildings around DuPage. Staff also created and installed a reproduction of the original 1932 mural for the stage.

#### **Museum Research**

Museum staff provides research services for \$25/hour with the first 30 minutes free. Reproductions are also available for a fee. See the table to the left for revenue and research requests numbers.

#### **Exhibits**

The Museum presented nine temporary exhibits based on artifacts from the collection in addition to items from private donors and other museums within DuPage. The Museum also hosted two temporary exhibits at the Wheaton Public Library and The College of DuPage during the summer and fall of 2017.

# Institutional Stewardship StEPs Program

DuPage County Historical Museum continues to work towards accreditation through the American Association of State and Local History's *Standards of Excellence Program* (StEPs) in 2017. StEPs is a voluntary training program consisting of five sections of three sets of guidelines that act as a checklist for museum Best Practices.

In 2017, the Museum continued work on the Audience section as well as working towards certificates in the Collection section.

#### Accreditation

The Museum is focusing on the following areas before applying for accreditation through the American Alliance of Museums (AAM):

- Continued care of and repair of building as needed
  - o New roof (completed in 2016)
  - Foyer repaired and exterior doors refinished (completed in 2017)
  - Humidity and temperature controls in collection spaces (progress made in 2017)
  - Public space environmental controls (in progress)
  - Replacement of carpet on lower level (complete 2017)
  - Update to safer LED lighting (in progress, to complete in 2018)
- Updating Museum policies including Business Plan (updated in 2017), Strategic Plan, Marketing Plan (updated in 2016), and Development Plan
- Policy check through AAM
- Establishing a timeline and fundraising plan for updating the Museum's permanent exhibit on the history of DuPage County (planning in progress)
- Completing an inventory of the Museum's existing collections (completed in 2017)
- Digitizing the Museum's collection (in progress)
- Instituting evaluation methods for Museum including exhibits and programming (in progress)
- Updating signage around Museum (in progress)

The AAM changed and updated the application process for accreditation in 2013. The most recent statistics on accreditation are listed in Appendix 2.



#### Personnel

#### **Wheaton Park District Administration**

The Museum building also functions as the Administrative Office for the Wheaton Park District. Museum Assistants serve in an administrative capacity for the District.

#### **Staff Development**

All staff is CPR/AED certified through the Park District Safety Manager. Staff also takes yearly online training though Wheaton Park District's risk management company. The Museum continued their partnership with Giant Steps for Autism-friendly certification trainings every few years.

Museum Manager and Educator Michelle Podkowa and Curator Ashley Downing attended the American Alliance of Museums conference in Saint Louis, MO in May. They attended conference sessions on board development, audience engagement, label writing, strategic planning, volunteer recruiting, and inclusivity and diversity in the workplace.

#### **Interns**

The Museum hosts interns throughout the year. Each college intern completes 210 hours and earns credit towards a degree. Interns focus on the area of study they prefer and the Museum staff teaches them their craft in preparation for their future career. In 2017, Maeve Prusnick interned for the Museum. She assisted with accessioning, writing press releases, and exhibit install.

#### **Volunteers**

In 2017, 13 individual volunteers served a total of 1661.17 hours. These volunteers are listed on the right. For a complete list of volunteer hours, see Appendix 4.

In 2017, the Museum Guild made the decision to retire. The Museum thanks all the members who have served the Museum since the 1980s, raising funds for special projects. As their last act, the Guild donated \$3,500, to be spent on a reproduction of the mural to be displayed on the stage and a digital camera. The remainder of the donation will be spent in 2018 on operating expenses.

The DuPage Society of Model Engineers (DPSME) continued to serve the Museum in 2017. They assist with members-only train dates for the children's Explorer's Club and volunteered for special education programs throughout the year.

#### **Marketing & Communications**

In 2017, marketing and promotional efforts continued to focus on the importance of introducing the Museum to new visitors.

Ongoing marketing includes regular e-newsletters, signage on the building and around town, the Wheaton Park District seasonal program guide, and online (website and social media) presence. In addition, ongoing communications via press releases and feature articles were distributed to a database of writers, bloggers and editors.

Marketing worked closely with Museum staff to design logos and labels for all temporary exhibits. Various workshops and programs are promoted on a monthly basis. These include exhibit workshops, summer camps, Train Saturdays, rentals, school and scout programs, and Explorer's Club children's membership. Design and advertising of Foundation events included Casino Night, Night at the Museum, and the On Par for DuPage Golf Outing.

The Museum continued to participate in Wheaton Park District events including Taste of Wheaton, Shakespeare in the Park, Fish-O-Rama, and Week of the Young Child.

Digital advertisements on targeted websites such as familytimemagazine.com, chicagoparent.com, and kidlist.com are linked directly back to the Museum website. In addition, staff always looks for free or low-cost ways to promote the offerings at the Museum through local libraries, other museums and park districts.

Nearly 50 press releases or articles were picked up by local and national print and web publications. A selection of these articles are featured in Appendix 5.

Staff collaborates on a regular basis to identify and find potential sponsors for various Museum and Foundation events. Sponsors have provided monetary support and/or product donations for events such as Santa Express, Casino Night, Night at the Museum, On Par for DuPage, the Museum's 50<sup>th</sup> Birthday Party and various exhibit events.

Museum staff participated in four interviews on television and radio including NC17 television for the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary, WDCB radio for *Death in DuPage*, WDCB radio for *Adam's Dream*, and WDCB radio for *Changing America*.

#### **Social Media**

Museum and marketing staff cooperatively maintain the Facebook and Twitter. Both social media platforms are updated two to five times per week. Posts focus on programs, exhibits, the Museum collection, and events at the Museum, as well as historical facts about DuPage County, facility closures, and other important information.

In 2017, the Museum and the Foundation boosted nine posts on Facebook. The Museum used IFTTT.com to coordinate posts between Facebook and Twitter accounts to ensure that followers on both platforms received updates.

#### **Sponsorship**

The DuPage County Historical Museum Foundation (Foundation) works with the Development department and Museum staff to find supporting exhibit and event sponsors.

A \$5,000 diamond sponsorship from the First Trust of Wheaton supported the two year, three exhibit series *Fun Unplugged* in the Inside History Gallery. *Fun Unplugged: Little Adults* was on display from November 12, 2016 to May 29, 2017, and *Fun Unplugged: Outdoor Adventures* opened July 15, 2017.

First Trust also supported the Museum's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration in 2017.

### **DuPage County Historical Museum Foundation**

DuPage County Historical Museum Foundation is a 501(c)(3) recognized by the State of Illinois. The Foundation's primary function is to raise funds to support the Museum's mission.

The Foundation works closely with the Development Coordinator, Museum staff, and Park District staff, with the goal to solicit donations, sponsorships, and coordinate fundraising events. These initiatives include:

**Casino Night** takes place at the Museum in March each year. More than 175 guests attended in 2017, continuing to build on previous years' successes, netting \$12,333.

In 2017, the **Explorers Club,** the Museum's children's membership program, was hosted the 2nd annual Night at the Museum Children's Party. The event sold out with more than 100 in attendance. The event was a terrific driver for the program, which also provides discounts and perks such as early access to Santa Express tickets, additional member hours for special events and train days.

Museum Foundation members and volunteers manned information tables and sold concessions at **Shakespeare in the Park** on August 25 and 26 to raise awareness and additional funding. This event is sponsored by Wheaton Park District and the Wheaton College Arena Theater.

The **On Par for DuPage Golf Outing** was held at Arrowhead Golf Club in partnership with People's Resource Center on Thursday, September 21, and welcomed more than 100 golfers. Featuring an Oktoberfest theme, the 2017 event was the final year of the event netting \$7,981 for both organizations.

#### DuPage Foundation awards grants to museum

WHEATON -- The DuPage County Historical Museum will present "1917: Catalyst for the Modern Era," a new exhibit commemorating the year's cultural changes that brought American society from the Victorian Era into the modern.

With a \$2,500 grant from the DuPage Foundation's Snodgrass Family Fund, the exhibit received a catalyst of its own.

"To me, this is one of the biggest compliments we can receive," said museum manager and educator Michelle Podkowa, "to be awarded for our great reputation, programming, and exhibitions."

According to museum Curator Ashley Downing, the exhibit will discuss daily living, technology, women's roles, World War I, medicine, disease, entertainment, Prohibition, and more.

The grant helps cover costs like a souvenir catalog highlighting the photos and stories of certain artifacts and an outdoor mural designed by local artist Rick Napier, which will welcome guests to the exhibit and may include images of soldiers, cutting-edge technology, and a Prohibitionist.

Opening Friday, Jan. 27, "Changing America" discusses two events separated by a century but linked by liberty: the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863 and the March on Washington in 1963.

Eight panels displayed in the museum's auditorium through Thursday, March 9, sketch the circumstances, from the slave trade in America to the scope of the Emancipation Proclamation, vocalist Marian Anderson's 1939 concert at the Lincoln Memorial, and leaders such as Martin Luther King Jr., John Lewis, Bayard Rustin and others who planned the March on Washington.

"In America, we really value our freedom, but America has not always provided freedom for everyone," said Michelle Podkowa, museum manager and educator. "I think it's a great exhibit to draw light to parts of those social freedoms we haven't always given to everyone equally."

The exhibit is complemented by recordings from Voices of DuPage, a partnership between the museum and the Wheaton Public Library to preserve local oral histories.

"We are super excited because we partnered with a local church and were able to get several interviews from people who lived in DuPage or now live in DuPage," Podkowa said.

"A lot of them tell stories


Spencer now is eligible to compete at the district level.

why, and why they wanted to do a dodgeball tournament," Benyo said. "They said they wanted to do some-thing for somebody who mat-tered to them. It was like they rehearsed this together because it was in perfect harmony, what they said."

The teens say the same thing now, more than five years later, after they've graduated from junior high, joined clubs and sports, formed career interests and watched their first gym teacher lose his wife last July.

They say the disease, something they d never heard of until it struck Denise, has changed them as well.

"I don't think we really knew how bad it really was," Gibbons said about ALS, which stands for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, a cause for which she and her friend now have raised nearly \$100,000.

"Seeing what it was actually like and how fast it affected" Denise was moving for Morrissey as well. "The first year she was in a wheelchair but could talk, but by the second year she was already having the machine that helped talk for her."

The frenzied fun of dodgeball aside, Morrissey and Gibbons say they got to see how Denise and Benyo kept their spirits up year round and remained "courageous and positive." The couple's approach has informed both of the girls' career goals.

Gibbons wants to be a nurse.

The growth of the tournament has been a learning and teaching opportunity for the students, who have been friends since meeting through their mothers and their Girl Scout troops in kindergarten.

They've learned to approach business people, build community support, run a fair event and raise money for a worthy cause. And they've taught their younger peers that trying to help even one person can go a long way.

"Last year they went back to their junior high and talked to all the seventh-graders and said, 'Hey, when we were your age, this is what we did," Gibbons' mother said. "'You can do something like this for another cause. Don't think you can't do anything when you're that

Organizers predict this year's Dodgin' tournament will sell out, and teams can sign up through Jan. 31 for the junior high, high school or adult divisions at \$225 for each squad of between six and 10 players. Registration is available at dodgin4lougehrigs.com.

about segregation and desegregation, the marches for open housing here in the county. And these are very influential people in the community today."

To recognize Black History Month, the Wheaton Public Library's Contemporary Book Discussion Group will examine "Whistling Past the Grave-yard" by Susan Crandall on Feb. 2, 8 and 14. On Wednesday, Feb, 8, the library's Great Books Discussion will compare Lincoln's Second Inaugural Address and King's Letter from a Birmingham Jail.

Letters, articles, posters, copies of the Emancipation Proclamation, and especially music, were among the techniques used by abolitionists in 1863 and demonstrators in 1963.

"Songs were used as an organizational tool, as a way to create solidarity," Vallillo said.
"Music has this ability to go beyond the moment and the time and to spread the message. It was a way to create bravery and security among demonstrators who faced physical violence.'

The "Changing America" exhibit provides context for Vallillo's performance.

"There will be places in the show I can quite literally point

to one of the panels and say, 'This song was sung on that day, in that place, by the people in that photograph," he said. "We're not that far removed. Fifty years is not a long time at

Though daily events can seem inconsequential beside the long tapestry of history, they're not.

"People feel history did not happen in their own lifetime, but history's being made every day," Podkowa said. "You may not be able to historically analyze it in your lifetime, but it's still being made, and it will still be recorded through primary sources — newspapers, emails, texts — and it could be pieced together at a later time and analyzed by future generations."

"Changing America" is pre-sented by the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture and the National Museum of American History in collaboration with the American Library Association Public Programs Office.

The tour of the exhibition is made possible by the National Endowment for the Humanities: Exploring the Human Endeavor.

#### From the community: DuPage County Historical Museum Celebrates 50th Anniversary This Year



Home to more than 40,000 artifacts documenting local history across centuries, the DuPage County Historical Museum turns 50 this year. (Posted by Brett Peto, Community Contributor)

When the DuPage County Historical Museum opened at 102 E. Wesley St., Wheaton, Ill. in 1967, it held between 5,000 and 10,000 artifacts. In 2017, as the Museum celebrates its 50th anniversary, it hosts more than 40,000 artifacts documenting the county's history, from objects used by early settlers to an actual time capsule.

Staff considers the Adams Memorial Building, the Museum's contemporary home, their largest artifact. Commissioned by John Quincy Adams-fourth cousin, twice-removed to the sixth President-to honor his late wife, Marilla Fisk Phipps Adams, the building cost roughly \$100,000 when it was erected in 1891, or about \$84 million today.

"Everything we have concerning those involved in the building points toward all the funding coming from Adams," said Michelle Podkowa, Museum Manager and Educator.

Adams drew money from his coal, real estate, and grain businesses to hire architect Charles Sumner Frost to design the building in the Richardsonian Romanesque style, a favorite of many civic structures, involving rough-faced stonework, wide arches, turrets, and ornamentation. Frost also designed the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition Maine Building and Navy Pier.

"It had electricity and rudimentary plumbing," Podkowa said, plus gas lighting, reading rooms, fireplaces, and 2,800 pieces of stained glass windows in the upstairs auditorium.

Before his death in 1899, Adams bequeathed a trust to fund Wheaton's first library for 30 years, even purchasing its first batch of 2,800 books for \$3,000, a value of more than \$3 million now.

"The original trustees had to go and look at the books, or at least have an idea of what was inside, to make sure they would be of value to the citizens," said Museum Curator Ashley Downing.

Filled with comfortable chairs, chess tables, and a Steinway concert grand piano, the auditorium gained two pre-Works Progress Administration-era murals by Otto Hake in 1932.

Facilitated by Katherine Sarah Adams, the only daughter of John and Marilla, the murals depicted scenes from the American Southwest: Blackfoot Indians exploring Glacier National Park, and the stories of Chief Blue Moon and Chief Black Boy.

"He spent all summer on scaffolding, painting these beautiful murals, and then halfway through, Katherine didn't feel like he was drawing them as well as he could, so she sent him to the West Coast so he could learn from the Native Americans," said Downing.

During a conservation project in 1999, the murals were moved to the DuPage County Administration building at 421 N. County Farm Rd.

In 1965, the Adams Memorial Library moved into its new location at 225 N. Cross St. as the Wheaton Public Library, but its former building wasn't vacant for long. The DuPage County Historical Society, founded in 1929 by volunteers, acquired and developed it over two years into the DuPage County Historical Museum.

"Margaret Dunton was considered so important the auditorium is [called] Margaret Adams Dunton Hall," said Podkowa. Some of Dunton's schoolbooks and papers from her time as a teacher are preserved in the collection.

So, too, are a few of Podkowa's favorite artifacts: a belt, rifle, and holograph from Marcellus Jones, a longtime Wheaton resident credited as the man who fired the first shot at the Battle of Gettysburg. He missed, but after the war, he kept in touch with the solider he almost killed.

"What I like about Marcellus Jones is he was so diverse in his skill set," Podkowa said. "He was a carpenter. He built his own house, which still stands today. He was a postmaster. He was a sheriff. He was a county tax collector. He also used to move homes. I think he's very telling of men and women in that time period. You had to be able to do a lot of tasks."

The Museum's five staff are working on years-long projects, like preparing for national accreditation from the American Alliance of Museums, and other efforts, like promoting the Museum for genealogical research and introducing new exhibits.

"We have ten exhibits going up this year," said Downing, including Hooked in April, 1917: Catalyst for the Modern Era in September, Death in DuPage in October, and Adams' Dream, a retrospective of the Adams Memorial Building, opening April 15.

A birthday party is planned for October to celebrate the only institution dedicated to preserving DuPage County's history.

"If you consider a long human life 100 years, 50 years is half a lifetime," Podkowa said. "With our [HO gauge model] trains, this is the third generation coming to see them. A lot of the grandparents were here when it was a library, and they brought their kids when it became the Museum, and now they're bringing their grandchildren. We have our own history now."

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

#### DuPage County Historical Museum exhibit looks at our death rituals

Modern American society often chooses to deal with death by avoiding the topic altogether. "Death in DuPage" is an upcoming exhibit at the DuPage County Historical Museum (http://www.dupagemuseum.org/) that will attempt to pull the curtain back on America's death rituals and practices -- something long considered a private affair only to be known by undertakers and to be hidden from the public.

The exhibit opens Saturday, Oct. 14, and runs through June 4 at the museum, 102 E. Wesley St., Wheaton.

"The exhibit explores historical culture, materials and beliefs around death in the county. For many, it's difficult to talk about," museum assistant Morgan Valenzuela said. "My hope is that this exhibit offers visitors an opportunity for thought and conversation."

Thanks to modern medicine and the increased popularity of hospitals, death and illness can be concealed and suspended. It is easy to forget that in the time of the DuPage settlers, fewer than 15 percent of the deaths occurred away from the home. Dying in one's home was paired to other death rites, such as the family being there to witness and record last words.

Victorians observed stricter expectations for the family of the deceased. There were guidelines in place for how long someone should mourn or how they should deal with the body. Today, most people die away from home, and an increasing amount (a projected 54.3 percent by 2020) opt for cremation over the more traditional open casket and burial of yesteryear.

"Looking back is fascinating but sometimes uncomfortable. To think about how we, as a community, used to handle mortality and mourning might inspire some visitors to consider how we handle them today," Valenzuela said.

Admission to the exhibit opening is free. For information, call (630) 510-4941.

For those dying for more, the museum and the Wheaton Public Library will co-host a related presentation from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 11, at the library, 225 N. Cross St., Wheaton. "Traveling While Dead" features funeral director Mark Hayes of Bolingbrook's Hayes Funeral and Cremation Service, who will explore how the dead were transported during colonial times, through the Civil War and to the present day. The program will pique the interest of not only history buffs, but those interested in genealogy as well. The event is free, but seating is limited. Register at the library's reference desk or call (630) 868-7520.



International tension, meddling in foreign affairs, revolutions and civil unrest -- these are not just contemporary problems of the world.

A century ago, the same aggressive stimuli wracked the globe. The Great War took a toll worldwide, but textbooks scarcely describe its impact on local communities.

Starting this month, the DuPage County Historical Museum intends to go beyond textbook accounts with its newest exhibit, "1917: Catalyst for the Modern Era," at the museum, 102 E. Wesley St. Wheaton.

The opening from noon to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 23, will include activities for families such as creating paper airplanes, designing an American flag and making a red poppy to honor the troops.

Running through July 30, 2018, the exhibit will feature uniforms from multiple branches and levels of the military, as well as the habit worn by one of the women who served in the Red Cross. Admission is free.

"The exhibit is very different from what we have done in the past few years," curator Ashley Downing said.

"Instead of focusing on the history of an object or a family, we are trying to focus on one specific year to provide our guests with a glimpse of what life would have been like."

During World War I, Illinois contributed 351,153 individuals to the war effort. Within the first few drafts, 1,000 young DuPage men enlisted in the Army, Navy and Marines. Some of their personal artifacts have been donated to the museum's collection.

In addition, the museum will host a Veterans Day event at 3 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 11. Local group The History Singers will perform World War I-era songs. Museum manager Michelle Podkowa will discuss Voices of DuPage, an oral history initiative at the museum, which will have a veteran focus in 2018.

"It will be an amazing event, honoring our troops and learning about the songs that inspired an entire generation," Podkowa said. "The History Singers present the history of the songs and their importance, making it an educational and entertaining event for all ages."

#### **DuPage Historical Museum celebrates 50 years**



Home to more than 40,000 artifacts documenting local history across centuries, the DuPage County Historical Museum at 102 E. Wesley St., Wheaton, turns 50 this year.

When the DuPage County Historical Museum opened in 1967 at 102 E. Wesley St. in Wheaton, it held between 5,000 and 10,000 artifacts.

This year, as the museum celebrates its 50th anniversary, it holds more than 40,000 artifacts documenting the county's history, from objects used by early settlers to a time capsule.

In honor of its anniversary, the museum will celebrate with a free "Golden Birthday" party for the only institution dedicated to preserving the county's history from noon to 4 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 21.

Staff members consider the Adams Memorial Building, the museum's contemporary home, their largest artifact. Commissioned by John Quincy Adams, fourth cousin, twice-removed to the sixth president, to honor his late wife, Marilla Fisk Phipps Adams, the building cost roughly \$100,000 when it was built in 1891, or about \$84 million today.

"Everything we have concerning those involved in the building points toward all the funding coming from Adams," said Michelle Podkowa, museum manager and educator.

Adams drew money from his coal, real estate and grain businesses to hire architect Charles Sumner Frost to design the building in the Richardsonian Romanesque style, a favorite of many civic structures, involving rough-faced stonework, wide arches, turrets and ornamentation. Frost also designed the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition Maine Building and Navy Pier

"It had electricity and rudimentary plumbing," Podkowa said, plus gas lighting, reading rooms, fireplaces and 2,800 pieces of stained glass windows in the upstairs auditorium.

Before his death in 1899, Adams bequeathed a trust to fund Wheaton's first library for 30 years, even purchasing its first batch of 2,800 books for \$3,000, a value of more than \$3 million today.

"The original trustees had to go and look at the books, or at least have an idea of what was inside, to make sure they would be of value to the citizens," said Ashley Downing, museum curator

In 1965, the Adams Memorial Library moved into its new location at 225 N. Cross St. as the Wheaton Public Library, but its former building wasn't vacant for long. The DuPage County Historical Society, founded in 1929 by volunteers, acquired and developed it over two years into the DuPage County Historical Museum.

"They knew they always wanted a museum," Podkowa said. "When this building became available, the historical society set up the museum and the county agreed to run it. The historical society stayed on as a guiding body until the early 2000s, and since then they've been partners on a lot of programs."

The museum's anniversary celebration will include activities and crafts, presentations and a performance by Sons of the New Amish. The historical society also will have its annual meeting, which will be open to the public.

"It will be quite the event for all of our patrons to thank them for all their support in the past 50 years," Podkowa said. "Some families have traditions for three generations involving our building and museum and we are looking forward to being in their lives for the next 50 years!"
